Many of the programs are celebrations and a number of them have elements that allow for students to give back to the community. Acmetonia Elementary School's grade 6 students spent the beginning of the school year getting to know one another and discussing growth mindset - how to change the way they approach a challenging topic. Using the book "Dream" by Susan V. Bosak - an inspiring book for young and old, that teaches everyone to set goals and follow their dreams - students examined their own thoughts and beliefs.

The book led students on a life journey, thinking about many points in their lives. Beginning with when they were born, to current time, and progressing through later life. They are asked to think about milestones and what they would like to do as they mature. What are their hopes...their dreams?

Under the direction of Ms. Kelly Slomka, language arts teacher, the classes created dream chests.
